## West Virginia State Tournament.

Many trapshooters from all sections of the state and a large crowd of visitors were present at the annual shooting tournament of the West Virginia State Sportsmen's Association June 16 and 17, at the home of the Charleston Gun Club, and the first day's events resulted in numerous excellent scores by amateurs. The highest amateur score was better by two points that the highest scars made by the transfer.

amateurs. The highest amateur score was better by two points than the highest score made by the professionals who shot separately.

In the amateur class the day's shooting showed in the totals of the ten events of 20 targets each, the following men with the highest total number of targets broken out of 200 shot at: G. E. Painter, 194; A. G. Higginbotham, 188; E. O. Bower, 186; T. M. McIntire, 184; J. A. DeGruyter, 184; W. Shattuck 183.

In addition to the ten event shoot, the shooting of the experts representing several ammunition and arms companies excited much interest, but perhaps the most interesting event of the day was the two man team race, which was won by C. W. Phellis and H. M. Shaul, of Huntington, with a score of 48 targets broken out of 50 shot at.

All of the officers of the West Virginia State Sportsmen's Association for 1909 were re-elected for the ensuing year, and other business of importance in connection with the organization transacted.

The re-election of Mr. Bower marks the fifteenth time he has been chosen to fill the office of Secretary-Treasurer and it is due largely to his efforts that the association exists as the successful organization it is today, for fifteen years ago he started the move-ment that resulted in its founding.
